Explore How to Create a Playlist



From the topic or lesson-level options, check the boxes next to the desired content you wish to include in a playlist. Click Add to Playlist. Then in the **Add to Playlist** box, click **Create New Playlist**. Type a title and description, then click Create Playlist.

Playlists can contain a unique combination of content that can be assigned at any time to your students. It's a great way to organize what you want to include as part of your classroom. It can also be used to organize differentiation support for a particular group of students.
