Use the following checklist as you implement peer groups in your classroom. Check the box if the descriptions are evident in your instruction.

Instructional Delivery

- □ Is the classroom arrangement conducive to peer-group work?
- □ Are students working in peer groups?
- Did I teach peer-group learning strategies to guide students as they work together?
- Did I set expectations for peer-group learning habits or behaviors?
- Did I set expectations for accountable talk?
- Did I facilitate peer-group learning?
- Did I circulate the room and meet with each group?
- Did I explain how to use digital collaboration tools?

Student Engagement

- □ Are students sitting in peer groups?
- □ Are students using accountable talk suggestions?
- □ Are students having respectful interactions?
- □ Are students participating in meaningful conversations?
- □ Are students collaboratively problem solving?
- □ Are students annotating the text?
- □ Are students researching information?
- □ Are students engaged and invested in the learning?
- □ Are students using digital collaboration tools?

- □ Am I following a gradual-release model?
- □ Am I documenting my observations as students meet in peer groups?
- □ Am I assessing my students' progress?
- □ Am I meeting with my groups on a regular basis?
