


Understand: Assessment and Remediation

Introduction

This guide looks at how assessments provided in myWorld History help students demonstrate enduring understanding of their world. This guide explains how the program helps students increase their knowledge and skills through appropriate remediation. It also looks at tools for assessment and remediation in the Assessment Handbook, the Unit ProGuide, and on myworldhistory.com.

Assessment Handbook

The Assessment Handbook is organized by tabs into six sections, including Test-Taking Strategies, Assessment Rubrics, Core Concepts, Chapter Tests, Final Test, and Answer Key.



Test-Taking Strategies

Test-Taking Strategies includes instruction and practice for students, such as analyzing multiple-choice questions and understanding and interpreting bar graphs.

Assessment Rubrics

Assessment rubrics in the handbook provide teachers with the guidance they need to assess reports, writing assignments, student posters, letters to the editor, oral presentations, and timelines.

Tests

For each Core Concepts part and each chapter in the student edition, there are two versions of assessments in the Assessment Handbook: Test A and Test B. Each test evaluates student knowledge and understanding of Key Terms and Key Ideas. The tests also assess critical-thinking skills and include writing an essay. The Assessment Handbook contains a final test for the Survey Student Edition. This comprehensive final consists of multiple-choice, short answer, and essay questions.

Answer Key In the back of the Assessment Handbook, the Answer Key section provides solutions for the Core Concepts, chapter tests, and the Final Test.

ProGuide The Understanding by Design® framework lesson plans in the ProGuide reference opportunities to assess students throughout the program.

Lesson Plans Each Section Lesson Plan provides direction to assess knowledge and skills as well as understanding. It also gives suggestions for remediation. Use the Section Assessment found in the student edition and the Section Quiz to check students' progress. The Section Quiz is found both in the Unit ProGuide and online at myworldhistory.com. Each Primary Source in the Unit ProGuide also provides instruction for assessment and remediation.

Assessments are also provided at the end of each part and chapter in the student edition. Students can complete The Places to Know self-test online at myworldhistory.com




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Online Assessments myworldhistory.com provides a variety of assessment and remediation for each Core Concepts part and each chapter in the student edition.

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On myworldhistory.com, all tests or assessments are labeled with a red icon with a question mark. Each folder with this label contains all assessments for the Core Concepts lessons and for all the chapters in the student edition.



SuccessTracker myworldhistory.com also uses Success Tracker—an online assessment and remediation tool to create individual study plans for students. Using this tool, teachers can pretest student knowledge of the content in the specific unit of study. Based on that assessment, students can be given a prescription of learning to remediate only the skills they have not mastered. After completing the individual lesson plan, students are given a posttest on the content of the plan.

Know It Show It Self-Test Another tool available to help students self-assess their knowledge and understanding of concepts is the Know It Show It Self-Test. This tool provides practice and assessment in a game format. In the ProGuide, this activity is labeled Self-Test.
