



Create a *myPerspectives* **unit theme board** for your classroom, a place to build excitement, capture new learning, and reflect on deepening understanding.

What is a theme board?

A theme board is a real or virtual bulletin board that shares key information about the unit: the theme, the Essential Question, the performance task, and anything else you want your students to have handy during the unit. It grows as students progress through the unit.

Why create a theme board?

Unlike traditional bulletin boards, which tend to be static, the theme board is a *dynamic* space to share and record key information about the unit and to capture student insight as it develops. Think of it as class-wide evidence of student learning.

How do I create a theme board?
